Guidance for Livestock Movement during COVID-19 Pandemic

This guidance is based on what is currently known about the transmission and severity of COVID-19 and information made available by <u>Nevada Health Response</u>. The Nevada Department Agriculture (NDA) will update this guidance as needed and as additional information becomes available. Local agencies may have additional guidance and/or requirements regarding these operations in their jurisdiction.

Recommended Precautions for Animal Movement

Animal agriculture including the transportation of livestock falls under the category "agriculture" which has been deemed "essential" under <u>Governor Sisolak's directives</u>. It is recommended that those transporting livestock prepare and take precautions to help prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Animal Movement Guidance

Social distancing

- Require all individuals to maintain at least six feet of space between each other when loading and unloading livestock.
- Only have one person travel per vehicle transporting livestock when possible.

Cleaning and protecting individual health

- Require washing stations or an alcohol-based gel before and after handling animals and before and after entering or exiting the vehicle.
- Limit vehicle use to one individual. If vehicles must be shared, thoroughly clean and disinfect the vehicle between use.
- All individuals should wear <u>face coverings</u> when around other individuals and should refrain from touching the covering.
- When handling contact surfaces such as handles, doors, etc. use good biosecurity practices such as disposable gloves, paper towels, etc. to avoid transmission.
- All contact surfaces should be disinfected frequently.
- Follow CDC <u>Disinfection Guidelines</u> when cleaning and use <u>approved disinfectants</u>.

Monitoring illness

- Monitor individuals for signs of illness.
- Anyone experiencing signs of illness should stay home, contact their healthcare provider and follow CDC-recommended steps.
- If anyone becomes sick:
 - o Close off areas and identify equipment used by the sick person.
 - Open outside doors and windows to increase air circulation in the area. Wait 24 hours (or as long as possible) before you clean or disinfect.
 - o Clean and disinfect all areas and equipment used by the sick person, such as vehicles, bathrooms, common areas, tablets, computers, etc.
