

Asian citrus psyllid quarantine FAQs

1. Can citrus be sold to people taking it outside of Clark County?
 - a. No. Plants cannot be moved outside of the Asian citrus psyllid (ACP) quarantine area. The label attached to the plant should indicate this.
2. How should suppliers handle the quarantine?
 - a. If the stock is part of the federal quarantine, suppliers should label it with the information required in the Nevada Department of Agriculture (NDA) ACP Compliance Agreement.
 - b. If suppliers are unaware of the Asian citrus psyllid quarantine requirements, they should contact NDA staff Marlea Stout at 775-353-3677 /mstout@agri.nv.gov or Jeff Knight at 775-353-3767/jknight@agri.nv.gov.
3. What do I do with existing stock?
 - a. If stock has been treated by a supplier within the last 90 days and you can obtain records of that treatment, you can obtain or create a yellow tag containing the treatment information required in the compliance agreement.
 - b. If it cannot be determined that the stock was treated within the last 90 days, then the stock must be treated and labeled according to the compliance agreement and the NDA ACP Treatment Protocol. Remember to follow label instructions and Worker Protection regulations.
4. Can I as a landscaper still buy citrus stock from a nursery?
 - a. Yes as long as:
 - i. It is not being moved out of Clark County.
 - ii. It has a proper/valid treatment tag (no older than 90 days).
 - iii. If it has been held past the 90 days, you must treat it according to the compliance agreement and treatment protocol.
