The Nevada Junior Livestock Show Board Endorses the
National Show Ring Code of Ethics

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INTRODUCTION

The Nevada Junior Livestock Show is held under the supervision of the Nevada Junior Livestock Show Board in accordance with the Nevada Revised Statutes. Throughout the rules, "Board" refers to the Nevada Junior Livestock Show Board, and "Show" includes the Nevada Junior Livestock Show and Sale. The Board makes and enforces all rules for the Show. NRS 563.010 through NRS 563.130.

The purpose of the Nevada Junior Livestock Show is to provide an opportunity for National FFA Organization (FFA), 4-H, Grange, and independent members to exhibit their livestock projects to the public, thereby promoting and incentivizing excellence in livestock production, skills, and practices. Such achievement and participation in the Show encourage the highest order of sportsmanship, leadership, citizenship, and responsibility among members.

Through the judging and placement of entries, modern livestock market standards are established, and members, leaders/advisors, and parents/guardians are educated on livestock industry trends.

As part of the Show, the Board offers a livestock sale for market animals.

DOGS ARE NOT ALLOWED ON NJLSB DESIGNATED SHOW GROUNDS, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF SERVICE ANIMALS OR SERVICE ANIMALS IN TRAINING, AS THOSE TERMS ARE DEFINED IN NRS 426.097 AND NRS 426.099.

GENERAL RULES **APPLICABLE TO ALL EXHIBITORS**

Interpretation and Enforcement:

The Board and Show Management reserve the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with, or incident to, the Show. Counties may have additional eligibility requirements recognized and supported by the Board, provided they do not conflict with Show Rules. An exhibitor who violates any Show rule will be subject to expulsion from the Show and loss of any awards. Future participation in the Show will be at the Board's discretion. Any adult who violates any Show rule will be subject to expulsion from the Show, and future participation will be at the discretion of the Board. Any dispute or question about decisions of Show Management must be presented to the Grievance Committee as outlined in the Grievance Committee process on page 12.

Rule Review/Development:

The Board will review the Show rules annually in the fall. The Board will solicit rule suggestions from the public after every Show. A Committee formed by the Board will evaluate these suggestions and forward recommended changes to the Board. The Board, at its fall meeting, will review, modify, and vote on the changes. Changes approved by the Board will take effect on November 15.

Liability:

All entries are accepted with the understanding that each exhibitor shall be solely responsible for any loss, injury, or damage done to or occasioned by him/her or arising from any animal or article exhibited by him/her. Exhibitors and parents agree to hold blameless the State of Nevada; Nevada Junior Livestock Show Board; Nevada Junior Livestock Show Board Representatives; Reno-Sparks Livestock Events Center (RSLEC); and other Show Management sites (facilities); Nevada Department of Agriculture; Board of Regents, Nevada System of Higher Education; University of Nevada, Reno; University of Nevada Reno Extension; Extension personnel; FFA Advisors, 4-H Leaders, Grange Advisors and other persons involved in the Show in case of accident or injury of any nature to the exhibitor or any loss or damage occurring to their property or livestock.

Conduct and Supervision of Exhibitors:

Exhibitors are representatives of their FFA, 4-H, or Grange organizations and are expected to conduct themselves appropriately. Independent exhibitors and supervisors must abide by all rules. Misconduct of an exhibitor, such as to reflect discredit on him/her, his/her chapter or club, or the Show, will be cause for disqualification and result in the exhibitor and his/her exhibit being *expelled from the Show*. The conduct must consider safety for all in attendance. Conduct jeopardizing the safety of animals or people will subject the exhibitor to disqualification. Malicious damage to the Reno-Sparks Livestock Events Center will also be considered a cause for the expulsion of an exhibitor and exhibit. In such cases, all awards will be withheld, and future participation in the Nevada Junior Livestock Show will be at the discretion of the Board. Adults are expected to act appropriately. Misconduct of any parent, guardian, advisor, or spectator that exhibits inappropriate behavior or distracts any exhibitor, NJLS staff, Judge, or any other person in attendance from the purpose of the Show can/will be excused (asked to leave) from the Show area. **Such conduct may be reviewed by the Board to bar people from future participation and attendance.** Any dispute or question with regard to decisions of Show Management must be presented to the Grievance Committee in the appropriate manner.

No wheeled rideable (bikes, scooters, skateboards, one wheel, etc.) will be allowed anywhere on the showgrounds. Meaning barn areas, inside fenced areas, or pavilions. They are allowed ONLY in parking lots. Violators will receive one warning. If there are further violations, the items will be confiscated until the end of the show.

Any use or possession of alcohol or illegal drugs is grounds for immediate disqualification and expulsion from the Show and Sale. Exhibits, exhibitors, and adults will be expelled and forfeit all rights to any awards, prizes, or the sale of their animal.

WHILE AT THE SHOW, ALL EXHIBITORS MUST BE RESPONSIBLE TO AND CHAPERONED BY THEIR RESPECTIVE ADVISORS, LEADERS, AND/OR PARENTS. ALL EXHIBITORS MUST BE UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF AN ADULT CHAPERONE AT ALL TIMES AND NOT LEFT IN THE CARE OF SHOW OFFICIALS.

Exhibitors will comply with all reasonable requests made by Show Management. For families who want to camp at the Reno-Sparks Livestock Events Center Grounds, please refer to this link for reservations and all grounds requirements.

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ELIGIBILITY

Mandatory Requirement: QUALITY ASSURANCE

As a condition of entry, all exhibitors must complete quality assurance training. This training must be completed annually. The Youth for the Quality Care of Animals link is available on the NJLSB website. Exhibitors must use their age level category (9/10), (11/12/13), or (14 to 19). Exhibitors must include their YQCA certificate number on their entry each year; you may attach a copy to the NJLSB entry. If an internet portal is used, the YQCA number must be entered on the portal entry form. All exhibitors are encouraged to coordinate with their county regarding options for completing their YQCA online or in person. YQCA must be completed by April 1 of each year.

EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY:

All Nevada and designated California counties' FFA, 4-H, Grange, and independent exhibitors in good standing who meet county eligibility requirements are eligible. FFA, 4-H, Grange, and independent exhibitors of Alpine, El Dorado, Inyo, Lassen, Modoc, Mono, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, and Sierra Counties, California, will be allowed to exhibit and sell at the Show.

All youth exhibitors must designate their organizational affiliation (4-H, FFA, Grange, or independent) and own their own market animal on the designated ownership weigh-in and tagging date (Dec. 1/March 1). An exhibitor may not switch to an independent exhibitor after the weigh-in date. Independent exhibitors will abide by all rules in the rulebook. With their entry form, they will include a signed Show Ring Code of Ethics and, at the weigh-in, provide a record book of the project animal (Available on the NJLSB website). All independent exhibitors will acknowledge and comply with the code of ethics when entering the Nevada Junior Livestock Show and Sale via the online entry system.

Any exhibitor disqualified from any other youth livestock show is ineligible to show at the Show for the period of ineligibility.

AGE ELIGIBILITY:

Age is determined as of January 1; all exhibitors must be 9 years of age on January 1 to show.

Senior Division: Includes any exhibitor 14 years or older as of January 1st of the year exhibiting. Exhibitors must be no older than 19 years as of January 1. FFA members are eligible until December 31, following the year of graduation from High School.

Intermediate Division: Includes any exhibitor 11, 12, or 13 years of age as of January 1 of the year exhibiting.

Junior Division: Includes any exhibitor 9 or 10 years of age as of January 1 of the year exhibiting.

Novice Division: Junior, Intermediate, or Senior exhibitors of any age who have never shown any species in any organized show, except for the current year. Novice exhibitors will not move to their respective age divisions or Round Robin competitions.

Pee Wee Division includes any youth aged 5-8 as of January 1 of the show's year. Pee Wee youth can only enter age-appropriate contests designed specifically for their developmental level.

Note to Parents / Guardian / Extension Personnel / Advisors:

By signing the Entry Form and/or the official entry portal, each parent/guardian / Extension personnel/ advisor acknowledges that:

- 1. He/she has read and agrees to the Show rules and regulations.**
- 2. The exhibitor has owned, fed, and cared for the market animal throughout the required ownership period. He/she has supervised the exhibitor and the animal/s have not had any drugs, chemicals, feed additives, pharmaceuticals, or other substances used on them except pursuant to the label specifications, or unless under the direction and supervision of a licensed veterinarian for therapeutic and medical purposes. In instances where drugs, chemicals, feed additives, or other substances for which the required withdrawal period has not elapsed prior to arrival at NJLS, that animal will not be allowed to sell or show in a market class.**
- 3. He/she has supervised the exhibitor, and the animals have not been tampered with in any way, including but not limited to unethical fitting or any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body.**
- 4. He/she understands the penalties for violating these general and specific rules and regulations.**

HEALTH AND PHARMACEUTICALS

Health and Brand Inspection of Animals:

To be admitted to the grounds, animals must show evidence of good health; no animal with a communicable disease to humans or an unsightly condition will be accepted. No animal showing signs of prolapse will be allowed to show, as determined by the Veterinarian or Veterinarian Technician. Animals with sore mouths, fungus, or other skin conditions will not be allowed at the show. Animals showing signs of respiratory distress, signs of worms or mites will not be permitted to proceed into barns or show. Open wounds and excessive scabbing are also grounds for dismissal, as determined by the Veterinarian or Veterinarian Technician.

Only properly labeled feed and feed supplements may be fed to any livestock showing at the Show. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hooves or horns which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

Every exhibitor, in consideration of his/her entry being accepted by the Show, specifically represents that the exhibitor's animal's natural conformation and structure have not been altered in any way. This alteration is also known as "unethical fitting".

Unethical fitting includes but is not limited to: injection of gas, air, oil or other foreign substances; cutting/tearing of the hide/underneath the hide or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter the physical appearance of the animal; numbing or "deadening" an animal's tail; cutting tendons of an animal; using foreign substances to build or cosmetically re-shape feet; as well as "twining" which includes The attachment of hair or hair substances (i.e. baling twine, cloth, fiber, etc.).

Any animal found to have surgical alterations other than dehorning, castration, or docking may be disqualified. Unethical fitting also includes attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development. The act of artificially filling animals internally and/or hydrating by esophagus is prohibited for all species. The use of stomach pumps and drench tubes is not allowed. Oral drenching for an animal's health and hydration is not against the rules. The use of oral drench guns and oral syringes is allowed for the animal's health.

No injection sites may be found in marketable areas such as the top, the rounds, the hips, etc.

Out-of-state exhibitors must present a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for all Animals issued within 30 days of the Show prior to unloading and admission to the Show grounds. This Certificate must be in compliance with all current Nevada Department of Agriculture Health requirements, the State of Nevada Swine Pseudorabies Eradication Program, and the State of Nevada/National Scrapie Eradication Program. This has been waived for all in-state exhibitors.

To be admitted to the grounds, animals must show evidence of good health; no animal with a communicable disease to humans or an unsightly condition will be accepted. No animal showing signs of a prolapse will be allowed to show (as determined by the Show veterinarian, vet technician, or trained/educated individual). Animals with soremouth, fungus, or skin conditions will not be allowed at the Show.

Turkeys will be inspected and excused if there is evidence of parasites or disease.

Show management reserves the right to require health inspections and diagnostic tests to be done before or after animals are admitted to the Show grounds.

Brand Inspections are required for all animals crossing a state brand inspection district boundary line in accordance with the Nevada Department of Agriculture Brand Inspection Laws.

The Board and Show Management will follow all Federal and State programs related to the transmission of zoonotic diseases, viruses, or other maladies.

USE of PHARMACEUTICALS, BIOLOGICS, and/or CHEMICALS:

Any violation of the PHARMACEUTICALS, BIOLOGICS, and CHEMICALS rule will result in the forfeiture of all participation in the Show. All animals exhibited must be cared for and fed during and after the Show at the exhibitor's expense until released by Show Management, even if the animal cannot show. The exhibitor, adults, and animals may be excused from the Show.

Only properly labeled feed and feed supplements may be fed to any livestock showing at the Show. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hooves or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

No injection sites may be found in marketable areas such as the top, the rounds, the hips, etc. During the Show, a licensed veterinarian and Show Management shall be notified of any animal on any part of the Show Grounds of the RSLEC facility or designated Show grounds/site requiring treatment or medication. Treatment must be administered by a veterinarian at the exhibitor's expense.

Entry into the Show signifies compliance with all pharmaceutical, biological, and chemical withdrawal regulations. Before administering any products before and during the Show, consult with a veterinarian and follow label directions. **A written prescription from the veterinarian must be supplied.**

The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of Market livestock sold during the Nevada Junior Livestock Show and Sale as follows:

- a. The use by non-veterinarians of animal drugs or other substances in any manner other than in accordance with the labeling approved by the FDA is a violation of Federal law.
- b. Any food animal must not exceed the FDA/EPA/USDA/FSIS established tolerance for any foreign substance, including drugs, pesticides, feed additives, or other chemicals.
- c. Violative results of residue testing are subject to investigation by USDA and FDA for prosecution.
- d. Any misrepresentation of a food animal that can potentially affect the acceptability of the carcass or milk will be considered fraud.
- e. Any Pharmaceutical not intended/labeled for animal use will not be allowed to be used.

Show Management reserves the right to conduct or require a test on any animal for illegal substances or substances exceeding established tolerances. If an animal or carcass is found to have contained illegal substances or substances exceeding established tolerances, the Board and Show Management have the right to impose appropriate penalties, including, but not limited to, denial of monetary awards and recognition for Show-associated contests or classes.

If a carcass is condemned for any of the above reasons, the exhibitor forfeits all rights to the sale proceeds, the carcass, and any awards.

If a carcass is condemned for any other reason, the exhibitor must pay back to the buyer the resale value of the animal, if requested.

ENTRIES

MARKET ANIMALS - EAR TAGGING:

All large market animals must be owned and tagged by the following dates. Beef – January 15. Goats, Sheep, and Swine – March 16. All ear tags must be prepaid. There is a \$20.00 per tag fee. This fee covers the class entry fees for that animal. Market animals will no longer have a separate entry fee. No refunds will be issued for any unused tags. All unused tags need to be returned to the Show.

The Board Office must be notified immediately if an ear tag is lost. Replacement tags are free of charge.

There will be no limit to the number of animals that can be tagged. See Market Show Entries for further information. Regardless of species, market animals may be selected for ear tagging (per individual exhibitor). One animal may be tagged as a family backup for all family members. The purpose of a family backup animal is to allow a family to have one backup animal if each youth does not wish to have a backup animal of his/her own. **At the Show weigh-in, a single exhibitor will declare which family member will be showing the backup animal if the family backup is being shown.**

An ownership record (eligibility form) for each Market animal tagged must be submitted by the FFA Advisor, Extension Personnel, Grange Advisor, or approved independent exhibitor's responsible adult to the Board office by the 30th of the month (December, March). This ownership record will list each exhibitor or family backup, the ear tag number for each animal, the animal's sex, breed, birth date, weight (if homegrown), and the exhibitor's birthday.

Limitations of Entries:

Show Management reserves the right to limit entries to the capacity of the facilities available.

Making Entries:

All Entries must be submitted through the current NJLSB entry portal. NO paper entry forms will be accepted. Digital entries for Market Animals (except rabbits) and all breeding and feeder animals must be postmarked by **May 1**.

A non-refundable entry fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) per class for all Breeding Show animals is due at the time of entry and by May 1. Any Breeding Show entry not accompanied by entry fees will not be processed and will incur a late fee.

Late Entry Policy:

THERE WILL BE NO LATE ENTRIES All entries will be digitally submitted through the designated online entry portal. No paper entries will be accepted.

Market Show Entries:

An exhibitor will enter all tagged animals on their entry form. An exhibitor may choose one club/chapter/group to show in the Market and another club/chapter/group for Breeding, provided they are members in good standing of both clubs/chapters/groups. An exhibitor may not show a market animal in one club/chapter/group or a second market animal in another club/chapter/group. Exhibitors must declare their market animal club/chapter/group on their entry form. All animals weighed in will be shown in their Market classes, and one animal of each species may be shown in showmanship. A total of 4 large and 4 small market animals per exhibitor may be weighed in, with a limit of 2 per species. **Exhibitors can sell two market species (large or small)**. The Blue-Ribbon animal must sell. If both animals are blue (red), or if the exhibitor has two species, the exhibitor has until one hour after the last market class to declare which animal will go to the sale. If no animal is declared, the Show office will choose. **The exhibitor may make no changes when the sale order has gone to print.** Each exhibitor must show and sell his/her own Market animal. Another youth exhibitor may show additional animals if the animals are in the same weight class. All Supreme Champion and Supreme Reserve Champion animals of each species must be sold at the NJLSB Market Sale.

Market animals that do not make weight on the scale will then be automatically placed in the feeder class for that species; the \$20.00 ear tag fee covers the Feeder Show entry fee. See Feeder Show Entries in the General Rules.

All animals must be shown in accordance with the Show Schedule. An exhibitor may be disqualified for failure to bring an animal into the ring at the appropriate time.

Breeding Show Entries:

The Breeding Show is open to breeding animals as listed in the class offerings. The same animal **cannot** be shown in both Breeding and Market classes. (Except where noted in class lists).

Registered and unregistered Breeding animals can be exhibited in the listed classes. Breeding animal entries must include breed, individual identification number, name of animal, and birth date, including the scrapie tag number for sheep and goats. The exhibitor must also list the animal's registry number if it is registered. An individual identification number for Breeding animals is required, as specified by the breed association. Exhibitors may show more than one species in the Breeding show. Each exhibitor is responsible for having a handler for each animal. **Crossbred Swine shall have one of the following: ear notches, "840" tags, or a farm ID tag if there are no ear notches.**

Exhibitors of all registered animals shall submit a copy of the certificate of registration from the respective breed associations. The certificate of registration for the animal shall stand in the name of the individual unless accompanied by appropriate lease agreements. Pending registrations-send a copy of the registration request with the entry form.

No animal substitutions are allowed

Show Administrative Fee

All exhibitors will be charged a \$10.00 Administrative fee.

ARRIVAL / CHECK-IN / CARE / SCHEDULE & RELEASE OF ENTRIES

Arrival and Weighing-In of Entries:

If an animal is deemed unsafe to all participants at the Show by the superintendent and two Board members at the time of weigh-in, that animal will be disqualified.

All entries must arrive within the time limits listed on the Show Schedule. Late arrivals will be disqualified unless Show Management accepts proof of an extenuating circumstance. Out-of-state exhibitors must present a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection for all animals, issued within 30 days before the Show, before unloading and admission to the Grounds. This certificate must follow all current Nevada Department of Agriculture Health Requirements, the State of Nevada Swine Pseudorabies Eradication Program, and the State of Nevada/National Scrapie Eradication Program. An official on the premises will verify each Certificate of Veterinary Inspection as animal(s) enter the Grounds. A veterinarian, vet technician, and trained/educated individual will visually inspect all animals at the gate. **Animal(s)** must be in the weigh-in line within 30 minutes of this inspection.

Blankets will not be allowed on Market animals during the weigh-in. Show Management will make every effort to achieve accurate weights. A State Division of Weights and Measures representative inspects scales officially within two weeks of the Show. Exhibitors or their representatives are encouraged to watch carefully when their animals are weighed and the weights recorded. If questions arise over an animal's weight, it will be taken off the scale, the scale checked and balanced, and re-weighed immediately.

The animal in question **CANNOT** leave the scale area until the dispute is settled. The scale weight is considered official if an exhibitor leaves the scale area without registering a protest.

All market animals must weigh more than their recorded tagging weight of January 15 (steers) and March 16 (sheep, swine, and market goats) when they weigh in at the designated weigh-in times for the NJLS Show.

Market animals that do not meet weight requirements at weigh-in may not compete in Market classes; the exhibitor may use them in Showmanship, Feeder, or Breeding classes where they are eligible. See Market Show Entries / Feeder Show Entries / Breeding Show Entries.

Check-In Procedures:

After the weigh-in, all exhibitors need to check in at the show office. Exhibitors will need to bring their weight slips, health certificates (for out-of-state exhibitors), and brand inspection (for out-of-district exhibitors). All Market animal exhibitors and a responsible adult must acknowledge the HACCP form

through the online entry system. The Exhibitor's animal will not be allowed to show if the HACCP form is not acknowledged.

Care of Entries - During the Show:

All animals exhibited must be cared for and fed by 8:00 a.m. each day, with water refilled as needed throughout the day until barn closure. (excluding poultry and rabbits) at the exhibitor's expense until released by Show Management, even if the animal cannot show. No animal will be released before the scheduled release time. Show Management has initiated a 3-strike system for feeding and watering violations (poultry and rabbits are exempted).

1. Warning

2. Loss of show placement

3. Loss of sale

Pens will be red-tagged for first and second violations.

All livestock, pens, and stall areas **must be cleaned by youth exhibitors** by 8:00 a.m. and kept clean and neat for public exhibitions until 6:00 p.m. each day of the Show. Water **may not** be dumped in high-traffic areas. Each **exhibitor** must properly feed, fit, care for, exhibit, and sell his/her own animal. Show Management reserves the right to excuse an exhibitor in an emergency situation or for reasons of impaired health. **Youth exhibitors are responsible for providing bedding for their animals (NO STRAW). Shavings are available for purchase from RSLEC, or exhibitors can bring their own bedding. Stalls/pens, wash racks, and aisles must be kept clean, from arrival to release. Stalls/pens must be spot cleaned daily; all feces and wet shavings must be removed and replaced with clean shavings. Failure to maintain stalls/pens could result in removal from the Show.**

There will be no blocking of the public view of any stalls on the premises.

Animal washing will be done only in designated areas.

Tack stalls are a privilege and, as such, will be assigned/provided as available. Tack stalls are for feed, grooming supplies, and animal care necessities only. No cooking appliances (crockpots, air fryers, hot plates) are allowed in barns or tack areas. No food preparation or food service is allowed in barns or tack areas.

Per the Reno-Sparks Livestock Events Center rules, straw is not allowed on the RSLEC Grounds.

To enter the Show, animals must be properly cleaned, fitted, and trained to be quiet and tractable in the ring. Animals that do not meet these requirements may be disqualified and will not receive awards.

All animals must be exhibited in the designated show ring to be judged.

This Show is for the youth exhibitor. **All** exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals. Breeders, "fitters", parents, leaders, etc. may assist in directing the exhibitor; the exhibitor needs to perform the majority of the work on the animal. **Exceptions to this rule can be made due to age, experience, or show conflicts of the exhibitor.**

Humane treatment of animals is mandatory. Any abuse of an animal is grounds for immediate disqualification, expulsion from the Show, and forfeiture of all awards.

Show Schedule Conflicts:

(Market, Breeding, and Feeder Classes): All animals must be shown in accordance with the Show Schedule. An exhibitor may be disqualified for failure to bring an animal into the ring at the appropriate time. If schedule conflicts arise, an exhibitor may make arrangements for another FFA, 4-H, Grange, or independent exhibitor to assist him/her in showing Breeding animals and Market animals; when both are in the same class, the ring clerk must be notified of the conflict and the substitution. All youth must wear appropriate uniforms in the show ring.

Release of Entries:

All live-release animals must have a live-release form issued by the Livestock Show office. Show Management will specify the release time for each species. An animal may not be withdrawn from competition without the consent of Show Management. Animals may not be released before the specified release time. Live-release animals include all species of breeding, feeder, and market animals.

All animals exhibited must be cared for and fed during and after the Show at the expense of the exhibitor until released by Show Management, even if the animal is not able to show. No animal will be released before the scheduled release time.

Exceptions:

- Dairy cattle, in milk production, can be released on the day of the Show for milking. See Show Office.
- Sale Rabbits and Turkeys may leave after the sale on Saturday, after payment has been made. See Show Office.
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GRIEVANCE

Grievance Committee:

The Grievance Committee will consist of three Board Members. Its purpose is to review grievances and render a final decision. Members must recuse themselves if they are personally associated with the grievance or with any of the people involved. In this case, an alternate member will serve in their place.

Grievance Process:

- Only contestants are eligible to grieve.
- All grievances will first be submitted to Show Management, which will convene the Grievance Committee.
- All grievances must be made on the official Grievance Form available at the Show Office, an extension office, State FFA Office, or on the NJLSB web page and accompanied by a deposit of \$50, which will be forfeited if the grievance is not sustained.
- Grievances must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, with the specific charges, a description of the facts, and the rule violated.
- All witnesses and their contact information must be provided with the grievance.

- Committee's rulings will be effective and binding through the remainder of the Show and until the next scheduled Board meeting.
- Grievances and decisions made during the Show will be reviewed at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.

Any dispute or question regarding rules and Show Management decisions must be submitted in the form of a written grievance, signed by the exhibitor, and presented to Show Management within two hours of the action or questioned incident. The grievance must include the resolution desired by the offended party.

JUDGES AND JUDGING

Judges:

Judges are selected for each species of livestock with the utmost care and, whenever possible, from persons of wide reputation. Judges are encouraged to give their reasons for the decisions they render. The object is to assist in the education of livestock producers concerning what constitutes a high-quality animal. To familiarize Judges with the Show rules, the Rule Book is available on the NJLS website. Individuals judging the NJLS Show cannot officiate at county qualifying shows, clinics, or demonstrations the same year. Recommendations for Judges can be made to the Board/Show Management at any time and will be kept for future reference.

Behavior - Toward Judges and Judging:

No person shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to interfere with the Judges during their adjudication or to offer any criticism of any exhibit. Any person who attempts to interfere with the Judges in any such manner, whether verbally or otherwise, shall be excluded immediately from the judging area/ring and/or from competition. If it is ascertained that a person or an exhibitor has, in any impolite and public manner, taken exception to the finding of the Judge, the Board shall cancel all awards to said exhibitor and exclude him/her from further participation in the Show. Show Management reserves the right to remove all exhibits of such an exhibitor without being liable for any compensation.

If the judge requests it, an exhibitor may be required to explain the merits of his/her own display, exhibit, or animal during the examination.

The Judge's decision is final and cannot be protested.

LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

The Sale is for Market animals ONLY.

All market animals entered in the Show must be sold through the Nevada Junior Livestock Show Sale, provided they are of blue or red ribbon quality. Exhibitors may sell one large market animal and one small market animal unless more than one entry is Supreme Grand Champion/Supreme Reserve

Grand Champion. All live pick-up market animals must be paid for in full at the time of sale.

Any animal entering the auction ring must have been entered, shown, judged, and placed in the specified market class. No animals not judged in a specified species class can enter the sale ring. The only exception is for scholarship animals. Scholarship animals not entered for judgment are excluded from the showing requirement.

The official identification of market animals (including ear tag number) must match all entry forms, buyer sale invoices/contracts, and destination reports for processing plants. Ear tags will be verified before entering the sale ring.

Livestock Sale:

Although not required to do so by statute, the Board/Show Management sponsors a sale of exhibited Market livestock to the public as part of the Show. Sale rules are made and enforced by the Board/Show Management as part of the Show rules. This part of the Show aims to help exhibitors bring their projects to a financially successful close.

Exhibitors are encouraged to contact potential buyers and invite them to the Sale or to provide bids for their animals. The Auctioneer's decision or update from the block/podium is final. The auctioneer will decide on any arguments or changes, and the bid announced from the block/podium will be final.

No exhibitor may exhibit an animal in a market class once it has been sold at another Junior Livestock Market Auction or Fair and sold as a market animal, regardless of ownership change. These animals may be shown as breeding animals, provided they meet all ownership requirements of the show/fair they are entering. Pre-sale activities for NJLS are exempt.

Market animals will be sorted and marked for live release and/or harvest. Marking could include painting. Beef, poultry, and rabbits are excluded.

The Packers and Stockyards Act will govern the Sale.

Obligation to Sell and Harvest:

All qualifying and healthy Market animals entered in the Show must be sold in the Nevada Junior Livestock Show Sale. All Market animals (Beef, Sheep, Swine, and Goats) sold and not being picked up live must be harvested at a designated harvest plant and entered in the Carcass of Merit Recognition Contest. An animal not entering the Sale ring in compliance with the Sale Order will be fined \$25.00 unless excused by the Show Management. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be prepared to enter the Sale ring on time. Private Treaty sales are not allowed through NJLS.

All Champion and Reserve Champion animals (rabbits and poultry are exempt) shall be considered terminal and must proceed to harvest for carcass evaluation; they cannot be purchased as "live release". It is prohibited to replace or buy back Champion or Reserve Champion animals from the packer

Exceptions to the requirement to show and sell their own animal can be granted to exhibitors who have a conflict with the sale time. These exceptions require exhibitors to arrange for another exhibitor

to walk the animal through the ring at sale time. The exhibitor must have a pre-arranged contract for the purchase of the animal. The exceptions will be granted on a case-by-case basis. Exhibitors must apply for the exception in writing, and it will be voted on at the next Board Meeting. Exceptions will only be considered for exhibitors who have a conflict with another school-sanctioned event or a medical issue. At the Show, the Board will review family emergency exceptions.

Live Release:

Buyers must declare that they are making a live purchase on the sale purchase invoice **(except for champions and reserve champions, which must go to harvest)**. No animal may be released until it is paid for. All live release animals must be paid for in full by the designated load out. If not paid for, it will be sent to harvest, and the buyer will pay the harvest fee.

No live release of live sale animals prior to scheduled release times. All other live sale animals will be in the care of NJLSB after the conclusion of the sale until released/transport by 8 A.M. Sunday. Market animals will be sorted and marked for live release and/or harvest. Marking could include painting. Excluding beef/poultry/rabbit.

Payment to Youth Exhibitor:

No check will be issued to the exhibitor until payment is received and has cleared the bank. Add-on recipients will receive their add-on with payment for the sale of their animal.

Commission:

A commission of seven (7) percent of the sale price of each market animal (Market Goat, Meat Rabbit, Sheep, Swine, and Poultry) sold may be deducted and retained to cover expenses of the Board for the purpose of partially defraying the cost of operating the Show and Sale. A commission of six (6) percent of the sale price of each Market animal (Beef) sold may be deducted and retained to cover expenses of the Board for the purpose of partially defraying the cost of operating the Show and Sale. A commission of one and one-half (1.5) percent of the sale price of each Market animal (Market Goat, Sheep, and Swine) sold may be deducted and retained for the Carcass of Merit Recognition award fund. A commission of one (1) percent of the sale price of each Market animal (Beef) sold may be deducted and retained for the Carcass of Merit Recognition award fund.

Necropsy Policy:

At the harvest facilities for the NJLS Sale, regarding any pre-slaughter condemnation or accidental death of sale animals, the following shall apply. Because animals that die prior to harvest or are removed from the harvest process due to ante-mortem inspection are not routinely necropsied by the USDA, no cause of death is available to the Board. The State Veterinarian's Office has offered to provide necropsy services should such an event occur. The Board will make any necessary arrangements with the State Veterinarian for necropsy and disposal. Prior to harvest a list of phone numbers of Board Officers will be provided. We hope this will help to simplify any problems that may arise.

Eligibility to Sell:

To be eligible for the Sale, Market animals must have qualified under all show rules, including weight limits, and must have been exhibited in a Market class of the Show.

Animals awarded a white ribbon or sifted for other reasons prior to the Sale will not be sold.

Sale Order:

Show Management will determine the order of the Sale. In general, blue ribbon Market animals will be sold starting with those placing highest in the Show, then progressively lower.

Carcass Information:

All Market Beef, Market Goat, Market Sheep, and Market Swine will be eligible for Carcass of Merit Recognition. Carcass evaluation will be conducted in accordance with the Carcass of Merit Recognition standards. Carcass of Merit Recognition information will be available to the public after the Carcass of Merit Recognition results have been calculated. Carcass of Merit Recognition is contingent on the ability to collect data. Data will be collected based on access to carcasses.

Registration of Buyers:

To ensure that proper and current information is obtained, buyers and potential buyers **must** register for a buyer's number at the Sale. A number will be assigned to each individual purchaser or potential purchaser, regardless of the number of animals or partial animals purchased.

Buyers must notify the Show if they intend to purchase an animal for live release. Live release is prohibited for Champion and Reserve Champion animals (rabbits and poultry are exempt).

Payment for Purchased Animals:

Buyers are encouraged to pay for their animals at the Sale. Invoices will be mailed to buyers who are not able to pay at the Sale. **Payment is due 30 days from the date of the sale.** Use of credit cards will be provided for buyers' convenience. Any invoice not paid within 60 days of the Sale shall be charged a finance charge of 1.5% per month until the account is satisfied. All legal options will be reserved to collect on delinquent accounts. Any attorney's fees and costs associated with collection are awardable. Animals bought for live release must be paid for by the designated load out, or the animal will be sent to harvest. **If payment for the animal is delayed by 60 days or more, the commission fee MAY be forfeited by the Nevada Junior Livestock Show Board.**

There is an added service charge for credit card use.

Add-Ons:

The minimum add-on for beef, market goat, sheep, and swine is **\$25.00**.

The minimum add-on for rabbit and turkey is **\$10.00**.

All add-ons must be between a registered buyer (who has a buyer's number) and a Sale participant, on a signed and properly completed Purchase Order or Sale Add-On Agreement (available at the Board Office, Show Office, or on the website). A buyer only needs one buyer's number to bid during the Sale and add-on. Purchase Orders/Sale Add-On Agreement will be available before and during the Show, up to sixty minutes after the Sale. Purchase Orders/Sale Add-On Agreements completed before the Sale are strongly encouraged.

If you have any questions about add-ons, ask Show Management, Species Superintendents,

Assistant Superintendents, or Show staff. You are encouraged to ask questions before the Sale. It is the individual's/business's/buyer's responsibility to understand the Add-On Rules.

No Commission will be charged to exhibitors for add-ons.

AWARD SYSTEM

Market Show:

All Market species are placed using the Danish System of judging. According to the Judges' decisions, in all classes, groups 1A or 1B will receive blue ribbons; those placed in groups 2A or 2B will receive red ribbons; and group 3 will receive white ribbons. (See Beef, Market Goat, Meat Rabbit, Sheep, Swine, and Poultry Rules for factors used in placing.) White ribbon animals will not be allowed to be sold.

In addition, all animals will be placed in the American system of judging. First and second-place winners will be chosen in each class. The top two animals from each weight division will then be selected. From the division champions and reserves, a Supreme Champion and Supreme Reserve Champion will be chosen, along with placings to fifth place. All Supreme Champion and Supreme Reserve Champion animals, steer, Market Goat, Meat Rabbit, Sheep, Swine, and Poultry, must be sold at the NJLSB Market Sale.

All market animals must be free of manure and excessive dirt to enter the sale arena.

Feeder Show:

All feeder shows will use the American System of judging. Eight (8) places will receive ribbons.

Breeding Show:

The American System of judging will be used for Breeding Show classes. Ribbons will be awarded to eight (8) places. Animals will be judged against breed standards and breed merits.

All animals, including pairs, must be brought to the show ring to be judged.

Animals chosen first and second in their individual classes are eligible to compete for Champion and Reserve Champion.

Breed awards may be given for each species to the best animal of that breed that receives a blue ribbon, if donors have requested and sponsored the award.

Showmanship Contest:

Showmanship classes will be placed using the Danish System of judging. In addition to the Danish System, the American System of judging will be utilized for the top eight exhibitors.

SHOWMANSHIP

Dress Requirements:

Show Board/Show Management will work with youth organizations to ensure compliance with the minimum dress requirements.

To enter the Show, exhibitors must be neat and clean and wear the official uniform, as required by their state organization. (Refer to the state/national manual of the organization.)

Boots or firm-toed shoes are mandatory for showing beef and dairy cattle and recommended for meat goats, sheep, and swine for safety reasons. If an exhibitor does not meet the minimum dress requirements, that exhibitor may not enter the show ring. (Example: no distressed jeans)

Minimum requirements for independent exhibitors are a collared, long-sleeved white shirt and clean, neat trousers. A dark blue or black tie is optional.

Showmanship Entries:

There is no fee for showmanship. Showmanship is optional.

An exhibitor enters Showmanship by listing the appropriate class on the Entry Form. The exhibitor may enter only one animal per species in Showmanship. Only Market, Feeder, or female Breeding animals **owned** and fitted by the exhibitor may be entered in Showmanship. Also, Market animals not making the minimum show weight or those over the maximum show weight may show in Showmanship. No uncastrated male animals are allowed in Showmanship classes. Except for Meat Rabbits and Poultry. Halters on sheep in Showmanship are discouraged, but will be allowed at the discretion of the Judge. With written permission, at the time of entry, of an FFA Advisor, Extension personnel, or Grange Advisor, an exhibitor may show in the next advanced Showmanship class because of experience. This advancement cannot be changed after the entry form is submitted.

Exhibitors showing livestock for the first time may enter Novice Showmanship. The class will be placed through eighth place.

Pee Wee Showman will not be allowed to bring their own animals. All Pee Wee showmen will use other exhibitors' market/breeding animals that are already on the grounds. DO NOT pre-enter; they will enter at the time of the show.

Showmanship Placing:

Since all Showmanship requirements are approximately the same, the following is printed as a guide. It must be emphasized that this is only a guide, and not all Judges will put the same emphasis on each area. Judges will vary the emphasis depending on the class, competition, etc.

Fitting: Condition, quality, firmness, and uniformity of finish	10%
Grooming: Clean, trimmed, brushed, blocked, feet trimmed, etc.	20%
Knowledge of the project: species and industry-related questions	10%
Showmanship:	60%
	100%

Round Robin/Master Showmanship:

Round Robin Showmanship will be made up of the champion and reserve champion showman in each age group in each species. A youth, awarded champion or reserve champion showman in their Showmanship class, must confirm with the clerk upon receiving their placing their intent to participate in Round Robin Showmanship. If neither of the two exhibitors in each age group per species elects to participate in Round Robin, there will be no representation in that age division or species.

The competitor is responsible for bringing an animal from the species they qualified into the ring for the Round Robin competition. If they do not provide an animal, they forfeit participation in the contest.

Scoring policy: The individual with the lowest score will be the best placed. For written tests, the highest score will be given 1 point.

Exhibitors will not show their own animals in the round-robin competition. Dairy Cattle and Turkeys will have a written test. The Board reserves the right to add written tests to any other species that do not have enough entries.

BEEF SHOW RULES

Safety:

If an animal is deemed unsafe at the Show by the superintendent and two Board members, that animal will be disqualified and removed.

Proper Training of Animals Required:

All beef animals must be halter broken. The Judge or Show Management may disqualify animals not sufficiently gentle to be shown safely. Nose leads will not be used in steer or heifer classes.

Exhibitors will have two (2) attempts to get their steer onto the scale unassisted. If the animal fails to make it onto the scale, the steer shall be disqualified.

Both neck ropes and halters are required for all beef animals while tied in stalls.

Ownership Dates: Market Animals:

All market beef must be younger than 30 months of age.

Members are encouraged to select their projects early under the direction and recommendation of their advisors or leaders.

Beef: January 15 of the year of the Show. The entry must be submitted through the online portal by May 1.

Castration:

All beef market animals exhibited must be properly castrated (both testicles removed) by the official ownership date. This means there is no evidence of remaining testicles. The sack must have fallen off if the animal was cut with a knife. If the animal was banded, the testicles must be completely atrophied. Castration by burdizzo is not allowed.

Homegrown Market Steer:

Open to all exhibitors who fed and raised home-produced market beef for the Market Show. To be considered homegrown, the exhibitor must own the dam at the time of birth of the offspring. Certification must be given by a local advisor, leader, and/or parents/guardians who are in the best position to know the situation. The Judge of the Show chooses the winner. **All homegrown animals must show in their weight division class to be eligible to show in the Homegrown Class.**

Feeder Show Entries:

The Feeder Show is open to Beef Feeder animals, as noted under the weight qualifications for each species. Animals entered into the market that do not meet the minimum weight requirement will be automatically placed in the Feeder class; they are no longer market animals and may not be shown in the Homegrown Market Class. There is no sale provision for animals in Feeder classes.

Breeding Animals:

Joint ownership is not allowed.

Exhibitors cannot combine breeding animal entries to create group class entries (except where noted (for example- Ewe with lamb, Does with kids)).

Exhibitors will fill out all information on the Entry Form in the online portal appropriate for the beef being shown.

Appropriate lease agreements must specify that the exhibitor is solely responsible for the animal's care by March 1 of the current year, and the animal is genuinely the exhibitor's project.

Classes may be combined or divided as the numbers warrant at the discretion of the Judge and/or Show Management. A separate class must be held with a minimum of five (5) head.

At least three exhibitors must be entered to make a separate division.

Females 24 months of age or over must be certified bred or have calved in the last 12 months.

No animal substitutions are allowed.

Dehorning:

Market: No horns permitted. Steers must be properly dehorned or naturally polled to enter the Show.

Breeding: Horned Breeding animals must have horns properly trained for health and safety purposes.

Feeder: Steers must be properly dehorned or naturally polled to enter the Show.

Fitting:

Any product administered internally or used externally to alter the conformation of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the use of any artificial coloring or substance added to the animal's body, as well as any grooming material that allows color to come off the animal. (Artificial color is acceptable on knees and below.) Any false tail switches, tail fins, or false polls will not be allowed.

Market Steer Weight Limits:

Market Animal	Minimum Show Weight	Maximum Pay Weight	Maximum Show Weight
Beef	1100	1350	

To qualify for entry into the **Market Show**, steers must weigh at least 1100 pounds. Steers may exceed the pay weight of 1350 pounds but will be sold at the 1350-pound weight. **Exhibitors will donate any extra pounds above the 1350-pound weight to the buyer.**

Market Weights – 1100-1350 (pay weight) entered as market steers.
Feeder Weights – 950 – 1099, entered as market, sifted to prospect
Prospect Weights – 600 – 949, could be entered market prospect

All steers must be weighed on a certified scale by a designated county official, certified, and ear-tagged **by January 15 of the Show year**. There will be no pencil shrink. The FFA Advisor, Extension personnel, and/or Grange Advisor will determine the official weigh-in day.

Animals not meeting this minimum weight will not be allowed in Market classes or to sell; however, that animal may be used by the exhibitor in Showmanship and moved to the Feeder class if under the minimum show weight (see Feeder Show Entries). If the animal is under the minimum show weight, it may be shown in an appropriate Breeding class if eligible (see Breeding Show Entries).

Allowing the entry of animals exceeding the maximum pay weight is not intended to encourage overweight animals; rather, it is to accommodate fast-growing animals, as holding them back may be detrimental to their health.

Market Steer Class Breaks:

Weight classes will be based on the animal's scale weight. The weights for each break will be set at the discretion of Show Management.

Placing of Beef:

Placing of steers will be based upon the Danish System of judging as follows:

Group 1. (Blue Ribbon)

- a. Animals grading USDA Low Choice or better, having above average conformation and showing indications of yield grades 3 or better.
- b. Young animals grading USDA High Select with superior conformation.

Group 2. (Red Ribbon)

- a. Animals grading Average Select or better with average or below conformation.
- b. Animals with average or above conformation and showing indications of yield grade 4 or better.

Group 3. (White Ribbon)

- a. Animals grading USDA Low Select or less.
- b. Animals in over-fat conditions indicate that they have a yield grade 5 with average or below average conformation.

White ribbon animals will not sell through the Sale.

The Contest will be held after the Homegrown Market Steer Class. The Club/Chapter/County Market Group must be identified by an FFA Advisor, 4-H Leader, or Grange Advisor to the Beef Show Clerk after completion of the Homegrown Market Steer Class.

Class 28 - Unregistered Cow with Calf (current year's calf)

Class 30 - Unregistered Pair of Females must first enter the individual Breeding class

Champion and Reserve Champion Unregistered Female

Class 31 – Best Bred & Owned Beef Breeding Animal: One animal, male or female, shown in an individual breeding class, must be bred and owned by the exhibitor to be entered in this class. To qualify as a bred and owned animal, the exhibitor must own the dam at the time of breeding. Entries must show proof of ownership at the time of breeding. One entry per exhibitor may be registered or unregistered.

DAIRY CATTLE SHOW RULES

Safety:

If the superintendent and two Board members deem an animal unsafe at the show, it will be

disqualified and removed.

Ownership Dates:

- Entry must be in the online portal by **May 1**.
- Dairy Cattle: **April 1** of the year exhibiting.

Joint ownership is not allowed.

Exhibitors cannot combine breeding animal entries to create group class entries (except where noted (for example- Ewe with lamb, Does with kids).

Exhibitors will enter all required information in the online portal for the dairy cattle they are showing.

Appropriate lease agreements must specify that the exhibitor is solely responsible for the care of the animal by **April 1** of the current year and that the animal is genuinely the exhibitor's project.

Classes may be combined or divided as numbers warrant at the discretion of the Judge and/or Show Management. A minimum of five (5) head is required for a separate class to be held.

At least three exhibitors must be entered to make a separate division.

No animal substitutions are allowed.

The dairy cattle have some exceptions to the entry and release times. All cattle that can be in place at the same time, as all other species, must be. The only exceptions are those cows in milk production that need to be milked daily. These animals may be brought to the Show on the day of the Show and released after the Show. All animals not in production will be held to the same rules as all other species. Exceptions can be made for dairy animals from outlying counties, provided they are in the same trailer as milking cows. Release forms must be obtained at the Show Office before release.

Months calculated from the date of birth to the NJLS Show date.

All Market goats will be wethers or does under one year of age. All Market and Feeder goats must be weaned.

Homegrown Meat Goat:

Open to all exhibitors who fed and raised a home-produced market meat goat for the Market Show. To be considered homegrown, the exhibitor must own the dam at the time of the offspring's birth.

Certification must be by a local advisor, leader, and/or parents/guardians who are in the best position to know the situation. The Judge of the Show chooses the winner. **All homegrown animals must show in their weight division class to be eligible to show in the Homegrown Class.**

Feeder Show Entries:

The Show is open to Meat Goat Feeder animals as noted under the weight qualifications for each species. Animals entered into the market that do not meet the minimum weight requirement will be automatically placed in the Feeder class; they are no longer market animals and may not be shown in the Homegrown Market Class. There is no sale provision for animals in Feeder classes.

No horns permitted. Market Goats must be properly dehorned or disbudded, with scurs no longer than

2 inches.

Breeding Animals:

Joint ownership is not allowed.

Exhibitors cannot combine breeding animal entries to create group class entries (except where noted (for example- Ewe with lamb, Does with kids).

Exhibitors will fill out all required information on the Entry Form or the online portal for the meat goat being shown.

All classes will be open to registered and unregistered animals. Registered animals must be tattooed, and the tattoos must match the registration certificate. If the breed registry allows microchipping registered animals, the owner must indicate that the animal is microchipped and provide the microchip reader to the officials at check-in. The microchip must match the registration certificate. Appropriate lease agreements must specify that the exhibitor is solely responsible for the animal's care by **April 1** of the current year, and the animal is genuinely the exhibitor's project.

Classes may be combined or divided as the numbers warrant at the discretion of the Judge and/or Show Management. A separate class must have a minimum of five (5) head. At least three exhibitors must be entered to make a separate division.

Open to all exhibitors who have fed and raised a home-produced market poultry for the Market Show. Poultry eggs must be laid by the exhibitor's project hen, and incubation must be under the control of the exhibitor. Certification must be by a local advisor, leader, and/or parents/guardians who are in the best position to know the situation. The Judge of the Show chooses the winner.

Exhibitors will fill out all information on the Entry Form in the online portal appropriate for the poultry

being shown.

Feeder Show Entries:

The Show is open to Poultry Feeder animals, as noted under the weight qualifications per species. Only Market animals that do not make the minimum show weight at the scale may enter that species' Feeder Show. The animal will automatically be placed into the Feeder class; it is no longer a market animal and may NOT be shown in the Homegrown Market Class. There is no sale provision for animals in Feeder classes.

All broilers and turkeys that qualify for the auction will be released live to buyers. Buyers will be responsible for the harvesting of animals. Exhibitors are required to assist their buyers with post-sale arrangements.

Exhibitors MUST follow all general rules.

The entry fee is \$20.00 for each entry. Each exhibitor is allowed four small market animals. E.g., two individual turkeys and/or two broiler pens and/or two rabbits, (or two and one and one).

Broilers must be hatched on or after 70 days before the first day of the current year's show.

Turkeys must be hatched on or after 125 days before the first day of the current year's show.

All Poultry entered must have a leg band to be eligible to be shown. This leg band must be placed on the poultry during check-in. The entry form must also include the hatch date(s) and breed. Any entry form not COMPLETE and accompanied by an entry fee will not be processed and will be subject to a late fee.

Poultry will be disqualified at the judge's discretion. The official weight shall be the weight established at the show weigh-in.

Market Broilers:

This class allows crossbred poultry. Meat pens shall consist of three (3) broilers. A meat pen does not necessarily have to come from the same hatching. Safety:

If the superintendent and two Board members deem an animal unsafe at the show, it will be disqualified and removed.

DATES: Rabbits must not be born before March 31, 2026

Ownership Dates- May 10, 2026 Entry Form Due – **May 15, 2026**

Ownership is one month before the first weigh-in date for the current year's NJLS Show.

The entry must be submitted through the online portal by May 15, 2026.

Market Animals:

Members are encouraged to select their projects early under their advisors' or leaders' direction and recommendation.

Exhibitors will fill out all required information on the Entry Form or the online portal for the rabbit being shown.

All single fryers that qualify for the auction will be released live to buyers. Buyers will be responsible for the harvesting of animals. Exhibitors are required to assist their buyers with post-sale arrangements.

The entry fee is \$20.00 for each entry. Each exhibitor is allowed four small market animals. e.g., two individual birds and two rabbits.

All rabbits must be born on or after 70 days before the first day of the current year's show. All rabbits entered must be tattooed to be eligible to be shown. This tattoo must be entered on the entry form and verified during check-in. The entry must also include the birth date(s), breed, and homegrown status. All homegrown animals must have additional verification of ownership. Any entry form not COMPLETE and accompanied by an entry fee, with the additional paperwork as necessary, will not be processed and subject to a late fee.

Rabbits will be disqualified at the judge's discretion.
Official weight shall be the weight established at the show weigh-in.

Castration:

All male market animals exhibited must be properly castrated (both testicles removed) by the official ownership date for each species, with the exception of Meat Rabbits and Poultry.

Homegrown Meat Rabbit:

Open to all exhibitors who fed and raised a home-produced market rabbit for the Market Show. To be considered homegrown, the exhibitor must own the dam at the time of birth of the offspring. Certification must be by a local advisor, leader, and/or parents/guardians who are in the best position to know the situation. The Judge of the Show chooses the winner.

Feeder Show Entries:

The Show is open to Meat Rabbit Feeder animals, as noted under the weight qualifications for each

species. Only Market animals that do not make the minimum show weight at the scale may enter that species' Feeder Show. The animal will automatically be placed into the Feeder class. The animal is no longer a market animal and may NOT be shown in the Homegrown Market Class. There is no sale provision for animals in Feeder classes.

To be eligible to show, the weights of market animals must meet the specified minimum weight requirements and not exceed the maximum show weight. Animals not meeting this minimum weight and exceeding the maximum show weight will not be allowed in Market classes or to sell; however, that animal may be used by the exhibitor in Showmanship and moved to the Feeder class if under the minimum show weight (see Feeder Show Entries).

Market Class Breaks:

Weight classes will be based on the animal's scale weight. The weights for each break will be set at the discretion of Show Management.

Placing of Meat Rabbits:

Placing of Market Rabbits will be based upon the Danish System of judging as follows:

Group 1. (Blue Ribbon)

- a. Animals having above average conformation and above average condition of flesh and fur condition.

Group 2. (Red Ribbon)

- a. Animals having average conformation and average condition of flesh and fur.

Group 3. (White Ribbon)

- a. Animals have below average conformation and below average
- b. flesh and fur conditions.
- c. Animals showing disqualifications.

White ribbon animals will not sell through the Sale.

The entry must be submitted through the online portal by **May 1**. Sheep: April 1 of the year exhibiting.

Sheep – **March 16** of the year exhibiting

Market Animals:

Members are encouraged to select their projects early under their advisors' or leaders' direction and recommendation.

Castration:

All male sheep market animals exhibited must be properly castrated (both testicles removed) by the official ownership date. This means there is no evidence of remaining testicles. The sack must have fallen off if the animal was cut with a knife. If the animal was banded, the testicles must be completely atrophied. Castration by burdizzo is not allowed.

Homegrown Market Lamb:

Open to all exhibitors who fed and raised a home-produced market lamb for the Market Show. To be considered homegrown, the exhibitor must own the dam at the time of the offspring's birth. Certification must be by a local advisor, leader, and/or parents/guardians who are in the best position to know the situation. The Judge of the Show chooses the winner,

Feeder Show Entries:

The Show is open to Sheep Feeder animals as noted under the weight qualifications for each species. Animals entered into the market that do not meet the minimum weight requirement will be automatically placed in the Feeder class; they are no longer market animals and may not be shown in the Homegrown Market Class. There is no sale provision for animals in Feeder classes.

Breeding Animals:

Joint ownership is not allowed.

Exhibitors cannot combine breeding animal entries to create group class entries (except where noted (for example- Ewe with lamb, Does with kids).

Exhibitors will fill out all information on the Entry Form in the online portal appropriate for the sheep being shown.

Appropriate lease agreements must specify that the exhibitor is solely responsible for the animal's care by March 1 of the current year, and the animal is genuinely the exhibitor's project.

Classes may be combined or divided as the numbers warrant at the discretion of the Judge and/or Show Management. A separate class must be held with a minimum of five (5) head. At least three exhibitors must be entered to make a separate division.

No animal substitutions are allowed.

Ewe/Lamb Age Requirement:

*No ewes with lambs under 30 days of age will be allowed to participate in the Show Born Before **May 10, 2026.***

All sheep must comply with the Nevada/National Scrapie Eradication Program and possess the proper ear tags. Females 24 months of age or over must have lambed within the past 12 months.

Wool Length:

All Market lambs must be slick shorn from the knee and hock up before the official weigh-in date of the Show. Fleece not to exceed 0.25 inch stretched wool length. Fleece must be uniform over entire body. Wool will be measured prior to weighing; lambs with excess wool will not be weighed or accepted into the Show until shorn to meet the satisfaction of Show Management. There is no fleece requirement for Breeding sheep. Fleece on Breeding sheep should be at a length appropriate for its breed.

Market Lamb Weight Limits:

Lambs must weigh a minimum of 105 pounds to qualify for entry in the Show. They may exceed the pay weight of 150 pounds, but they will be sold at that weight. Exhibitors will donate any extra poundage above the 150-pound **limit to the buyer**.

All lambs must be weighed on a certified scale by a designated county official, certified, and ear-tagged by **March 16, 2026**. There will be no pencil shrink. The FFA Advisor, Extension personnel, and/or Grange Advisor will determine the official weigh-in day.

Animals not meeting this minimum weight will not be allowed in Market classes or to sell; however, that animal may be used by the exhibitor in Showmanship and moved to the Feeder class if under the minimum show weight (see Feeder Show Entries). If the animal is under the minimum show weight, it may be shown in an appropriate Breeding class if eligible (see Breeding Show Entries). The intention of allowing entry of animals exceeding the maximum pay weight is not to encourage overweight animals; rather, the purpose is to accommodate fast-growing animals as it may be detrimental to the animal if held back.

Market Lamb Class Breaks:

Weight classes will be based on the animal's scale weight. The weights for each break will be set at the discretion of Show Management.

Placing of Market Sheep:

Placing of lambs will be based upon the Danish System of judging as follows:

Group 1. (Blue Ribbon):

- a. Animals grading USDA Low Choice or better, having above average conformation and showing indications of yielding a high percentage of lean to fat.

Group 2. (Red Ribbon);

- a. Animals grading USDA Choice, having average or below conformation.
- b. Animals grading USDA Choice, but having either more or less than desirable finish.

Group 3. (White Ribbon):

- a. Animals grading USDA Good.
- b. Over-fat animals are indicating a yield grade of 5.

White ribbon animals will not sell through the Sale.

Class 192 - NEVADA STATE EWE LAMB FUTURITY

The Nevada Junior Livestock Show and Sale will host the long-standing Nevada State Ewe Lamb Futurity. The Ewe Lamb Futurity was initiated to encourage Nevada Youth to strive for excellence with their sheep breeding projects and management programs. All youth between the ages of 9 and 19 as of January 1st of the year, exhibiting, are eligible, provided they are Nevada residents.

ENTRY FEES: \$10.00 per animal, Lamb Verification Form. This must be done to show in the Ewe Lamb Futurity.

Classes:

01. Ewe/Lamb Pair - Ewes tattooed in 2024 (3rd year of Futurity)

02. Yearling Ewes - Ewes tattooed in 2025 (2nd year of Futurity).

03. Ewe lamb - Ewe tattooed in 2026 (1st year of Futurity).

Lamb will be permanently identified directly after class.

Futurity Champion: – After three full years of competition, the overall winner will be awarded \$200.00 and an NJLS Trophy Buckle. Cash awards will be paid to the overall winner at the end of a three-year competition.

• Quality placing by the Danish System for point system (no premiums). Class placing by American System to determine 1st place (no premiums).

YEAR #1

1. The exhibitor must own all ewe lambs at the time of entry. Proof of ownership may be required.

2. Lambs officially entered into the futurity program will be assigned an ear tattoo number, which will be applied at a designated time of the show.

3. Senior members who begin with an ewe lamb will be eligible to compete for three consecutive years.

Senior members may transfer entries only to another immediate family member.

4. A numerical score will be assigned to ribbon placing, and totals will be accumulated for a three-year period (see section on scoring).

YEAR #2

1. The second year of competition will feature a class designated for Yearling Futurity Ewes, which have been previously shown and identified with tattoos as ewe lambs.

2. Points will be given for lambs out of yearling ewes. Lambs do not show with ewe.

3. Lambs tattooed in 2023 and offspring in 2024 (2nd year of futurity) will count under these conditions. Ewe lamb must be 150 lbs. or 9 months of age or older at the time of breeding. Ewe lamb must be well supervised by a Parent/Leader or Advisor.

YEAR #3

1. In the third year of competition, the ewe will be shown **with** the offspring from that year. The ewe and her offspring will be evaluated as a unit for quality placing. (The ewe should be bred to lamb in order for the lamb(s) to be of marketable age and weight upon evaluation at the NJLS Show).

2. Lambs shown in this class with the ewes are also eligible for other market or breeding classes in the show. Ewes can also be shown in regular classes. Ewe lambs are eligible to enter in first year futurity competition.

3. Entry Fee of \$10.00 paid for the Ewe only; no additional animal" fee for lambs.

SCORING

A numerical value will be assigned to ribbon placing as follows: Red Ribbon = 2 points; Blue Ribbon = 3 points, 1st Place in class = 4 points

Points for lamb produced by ewe in futurity will be added to ribbon placing points. One-half point (.5) for each lamb weaned by ewes and tattooed in 2023 as a 2-year-old and Yearling Ewes tattooed in 2024. The Leader, Advisor or County 4-H professional in the county where the youth resides will certify lambs weaned. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to have verification made. Signed lamb verification sheets must be presented at the time of entry for earned points to be added to the final score. **NO EXCEPTIONS.** Verification sheets may be obtained from the NJLS Office.

A record of each ewe lamb entered in the futurity will be retained in the NJLS Office. Numerical scores will be added together to obtain a cumulative score at the end of each year. At the end of the three years of competition, the scores will be compared and the ewe with the highest overall score will be declared the winner.

TIE BREAKER: If ties result after the final competition, the lamb(s) of the ewes involved will be re-evaluated. The official judge will determine the winner on the basis of the quality of lamb(s) the ewe has produced.

Feeder Show Entries:

The Show is open to Swine Feeder animals as noted under the weight qualifications for each species. Animals entered into the market that do not meet the minimum weight requirement will be automatically placed in the Feeder class; they are no longer market animals and may not be shown in the Homegrown Market Class. There is no sale provision for animals in Feeder classes.

Garbage-Fed Hogs Excluded:

Nevada Livestock Sanitary Regulations require no garbage-fed hogs to be allowed in livestock shows.

Fitting Swine – Any product administered internally or used externally to alter the conformation of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the use of artificial coloring or substances added to an animal's body, as well as any grooming material that allows color to come off the animal. Animals may be subject to a white or black glove/cloth wipe down

LEEANNA HENRY MEMORIAL RATE OF GAIN CONTEST

This contest is designed to enhance the program's educational value and encourage production standards that would provide a positive learning experience for young people. Rate of gain is a very important measurement in the livestock production industry. Participants in this program should understand how the rate of gain is measured and why it is important.

Contest Outline:

Market Beef, Market Goat, Market Lamb, and Market Swine will be eligible.
Monetary awards will be presented for each species, based on the donations received.

Any participants in the Nevada Junior Livestock Show who provide the necessary information will be included in this Contest. Necessary information that must be provided on the species eligibility form:

Birth date
Date of Certification
Initial weight

Beef must be weighed by January 15

Market Goats must be weighed by March 16

Sheep must be weighed by March 16

Swine must be weighed by March 16

The beginning certification weight is the adjusted weight at ear tagging, and the final weight is at the show weigh-in.

All white ribbon animals are ineligible.

Weight per day of age will be used as a tiebreaker.

The FFA Advisor, Extension Personnel, and/or Grange Advisor will determine the official weigh-in day.

Class 218 - YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Nevada Junior Livestock Show Board established a Youth Advisory Council (YAC) in 1990. The council is comprised of exhibitors entered in and showing at the current Show. Past councils have provided valuable input that has been incorporated into the planning of future Shows. The Board's intent is that this Council will be of and for youth involved in the Show. The youth will be the determining factors as to the direction and functions of the Council. The YAC is to provide a written report to the Board following the Show and Sale.

Council members must be willing and able to meet daily during the Show and, if possible, prior to the Show.

The Board has two main objectives in forming this Council. They are:

- To provide leadership opportunities for youth
- Obtain pertinent input from Show participants

Responsibilities of the Council include:

- Actively assisting with Show and Sale operations
- Meeting on a daily basis during the Show (Lunch/Dinner), and refreshment hosts and servers
- Awards Ceremony (must be in uniform)
- Serving as representatives of all exhibitors
- Serving as a liaison for exhibitors, the Board, and other interested parties
- Developing a written report for the Board to be turned in before the next Board Meeting

Public Relations – The Youth Advisory Council will provide and display a QR Code for exhibitors, participants, families, and the general public throughout the Show Grounds to provide feedback regarding the Show.

Requirements for the application are as follows:

- Must have entered the current year's Show
- Must have exhibited in at least one previous Nevada Junior Livestock Show
- Council members will serve a one-year term
- Submit a photo of the applicant with the application
- Must have completed all YAC responsibilities from the previous year to be eligible for the current year

All Scholarship applications must be submitted digitally by April 11· 11:59 p.m. to njlsb@agri.nv.gov of the current application year.

Any extenuating circumstances or exceptions to the application process shall be determined by the NJLS Board.

Applicants must be high school seniors at the time of application. Applicants must currently be exhibiting at the Show and have previously participated for at least 1 year.

Applicants must provide a transcript of grades with a minimum unweighted Grade Point Average of 2.5 on a scale of 4.0 (4.0 =A). ACT and /or SAT scores may be considered; scores should be provided by the applicant.

To apply for Scholarships, the following must be sent via email to the NJLSB email address, NJLSB@agri.nv.gov

1. An Official Nevada Junior Livestock Show Scholarship Application
2. ACT and/or SAT scores
3. A one to two-page resume with a small personal photo (small snapshot or school photo.
4. Transcripts from all high schools attended, having a minimum unweighted Grade Point Average of 2.5 on a scale of 4.0 (4.0=A).
5. A 1–2-page essay including a summary of leadership activities, volunteer community service, citizenship activities, school activities, NJLS awards, achievements, and other awards.
6. One letter of recommendation from a non-relative.

Review Process:

A list of applicants being reviewed will be presented to the NJLS Board for approval.

Some, but not all, applicants will be interviewed for scholarships before the Show. It is possible that not all applicants interviewed will receive a scholarship. Any extenuating circumstances or exceptions shall be decided by the NJLS Board.

All applicants will be evaluated using the same rubric to ensure equitable scoring.

Funding of Scholarships:

The list of awards will be presented to the NJLS Board for approval.

The number and amount of Scholarships to be awarded are based on available funds. Each

scholarship is a one-time award of at least \$500. Distribution of funds will be sent to the postgraduate school at the completion of the first term and /or second term, provided the following criteria are met.

1. Students must sign the Memo of Agreement outlining funding of the scholarship prior to the funds being dispersed.
2. Award recipients must enroll within the year awarded (by the Fall/Winter Term).
3. Awards of over \$1000.00 will be distributed in each of two successive terms upon receipt of transcripts and/or proof of grades. Transcripts must include the student's name and student information
4. I.D. number from the previous grading term showing full-time, paid enrollment (12 credits) and a minimum of 2.5 GPA
5. Awards of \$1000.00 or less will be made in one payment upon receipt of transcripts and/or proof of grades from the previous grading term showing full-time, paid enrollment (12 credits) and a minimum of 2.5 GPA. Transcripts must include the student's name and Student I.D. number.
6. If a student does not meet the grade and/or credit requirements in the first term, they will forfeit ½ of the award (if the amount is over \$1000) and have one more consecutive term to reach eligibility. If they fail to meet the second-term criteria, the award is forfeited.

Any incomplete applications will be returned to the applicant, who may resubmit the official application form for consideration. Corrected forms must be submitted within five days from the return date.
